Master's in Human Rights and Migration Studies

The **Department of Balkan, Slavic and Oriental Studies** and the **Department of International and European Studies** offers a **Postgraduate Programme** leading to a Master's Degree in Human Rights and Migration Studies. The aim of this course is to provide a **high-quality educational opportunity** for students interested in these two related disciplines in preparation for a career in fields such as human rights monitoring and implementation as well as services and management of regular and irregular migration.

The course consists of three semesters, two of which require class attendance at mandatory courses, while the third is dedicated to the writing of a dissertation. During the third semester students are not required to reside in Thessaloniki.
